The <u>World Food Prize Foundation</u> created the Iowa Hunger Summit in 2006 with former Iowa Governors Robert D. Ray, Terry E. Branstad, and Tom Vilsack serving as honorary co-chairs.

The 2021 virtual Summit gathered leaders from across lowa, representing non-profits, community organizations, businesses, governments, religious communities, schools, and others active in projects to address hunger.

Iowa Without Hunger by 2030

The 2021 <u>Iowa Hunger Summit</u> focused on transformations needed to eliminate hunger and greatly reduce levels of chronic, non-communicable food-related diseases. Coupled with the theme of transformation, the Summit aimed to spur on societal action to deal with the root causes of hunger. With messages from <u>Iowa Governor Kim Reynolds</u>, <u>Iowa Farm Bureau President</u> <u>Craig Hill</u>, and <u>Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig</u> all calling for stronger efforts to eliminate hunger, the Summit affirmed that with sustained effort, the state could be free from hunger by 2030.

Janie Simms Hipp, USDA General Counsel and the <u>Summit's keynote speaker</u>, inspired participants by drawing on her lifetime of achievement in food, farming, hunger, and agricultural law. Ms. Simms Hipp's speech shaped hunger discussions throughout the event. <u>The panel "Food Systems Transformations and Action: Confronting Iowa's Sustainable Food Needs,"</u> was lauded for its dynamic discussion about necessary evolutions needed to help Iowans struggling with hunger. The inspiration for this panel was the scale up that Iowa food banks achieved during COVID-19 economic disruptions. This scale up helped to limit the damage that occurred when the effects of COVID-19 substantially increased the need for food aid across Iowa. The World Food Prize Foundation advocated for nutrition-sensitive policy discussions in this year's Summit, including <u>a fireside chat on nutrition-sensitive food</u> systems, demonstrating the need to see beyond emergency food aid and address root causes.

Four succinct workshops during the Summit showcased statewide and nationwide efforts. These workshops demonstrated both the diversity and strength of organizations working to eliminate hunger. The workshops were titled:

- The Building Blocks of Hunger: Feeding Iowa's Children
- Next Steps in your Organization's Racial Equity Journey
- Building Partnerships through Healthcare: Paving the Way to Food Access
- Food Rescue Assessments: Understanding Barriers to Food Donation and Finding Solutions

<u>The closing session</u> of the Summit focused on racial equity and gains necessary to address financial and job-related stressors which cause food insecurity. This session demonstrated the financial obstacles that minority groups have historically faced in Iowa and how the legacy of discrimination has dire ramifications today.

Based on the success of this virtual Summit, the World Food Prize Foundation aspires to increase programming and include additional events. The Foundation is grateful for the longstanding, continued support of its presenting sponsors, the Iowa Farm Bureau Federation and Farm Bureau Financial Services.
